SYNOPSIS

Requires DOH to study indoor air quality at public schools, develop list of common indoor air contaminants at public schools, and establish guidance regarding potential mitigation measures.

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AN ACT concerning indoor air quality in public schools and 1 2 supplementing Title 26 of the Revised Statutes. 3 4 BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State 5 of New Jersey: 6 7 1. a. As used in this section: 8 "Department" means the Department of ¹[Environmental 9 Protection Health¹. 10 "Hazardous air pollutant" means the same as that term is defined by section 2 of P.L.1954, c.212 (C.26:2C-2). 11 12 "Indoor air contaminant" means any substance, other than water or 13 distillates of air, which is present in a building's internal atmosphere as 14 solid particles, liquid particles, vapors, or gases. 15 "Indoor air quality" means the quality of air inside a closed 16 building. 17 "Public school" means the same as that term is defined in 18 N.J.S.18A:1-1. b. Within one year after the effective date of this act, the 19 20 Department of ¹[Environmental Protection] Health¹, acting in cooperation and consultation with the ¹Department of Environmental 21 22 Protection,¹ Department of Education, the Rutgers Center for Green 23 Building, and any other organization deemed by the department to be 24 appropriate, shall conduct a public school indoor air quality study 25 using a representative sampling of public schools in the State. The 26 representative sampling of schools shall include: 27 (1) schools that represent diverse regions of the State and provide 28 varying levels of education to students of all ages, including at least 29 one preschool, one kindergarten, one elementary school, one middle 30 school, and one high school located in each of the northern, central, 31 and southern regions of the State; and 32 (2) schools of varying ages, including, to the extent practicable, at 33 least: one school constructed within the five year period immediately 34 preceding the effective date of this act; one school constructed not less 35 than five years, nor more than 10 years, prior to the effective date of 36 this act; one school constructed not less than 10 years, nor more than 37 15 years, prior to the effective date of this act; one school constructed 38 not less than 15 years, nor more than 25 years, prior to the effective 39 date of this act; one school constructed not less than 25 years, nor 40 more than 50 years, prior to the effective date of this act; and one 41 school constructed more than 50 years prior to the effective date of this 42 act. 43 c. In conducting the public school indoor air quality study 44 pursuant to this section, the department shall: EXPLANATION – Matter enclosed in bold-faced brackets [thus] in the above bill is not enacted and is intended to be omitted in the law.

Matter enclosed in superscript numerals has been adopted as follows: ¹Senate SEN committee amendments adopted January 14, 2025.

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1 (1) identify, for each school in the representative sample, the levels 2 of carbon dioxide (CO2), carbon monoxide (CO), nitrogen dioxide 3 (NO2), sulfur dioxide (SO2), volatile organic compounds (VOCs), fine 4 particulate matter (PM 2.5), hazardous air pollutants, and other indoor 5 air contaminants that are present in the indoor air at each such school, 6 and extrapolate, from the representative sampling, the total number of 7 public schools in the State where each such indoor air contaminant 8 may be present and the estimated level of each indoor air contaminant 9 at each such school in the State;

10 (2) compile a list of the most common indoor air contaminants in11 public schools; and

12 (3) develop and publish guidance documents for public schools 13 and school districts describing the ways in which such schools may 14 take action to reduce the presence or mitigate the effects of indoor air 15 contaminants identified on the list prepared pursuant to paragraph (2) 16 of this subsection. In developing guidance documents pursuant to this 17 paragraph, the department shall consider and incorporate, as deemed 18 appropriate, any existing guidance on this issue that has been 19 published by the Department of ¹[Health] Environmental Protection¹ or the United States Environmental Protection Agency. 20

d. The Department of ¹[Environmental Protection] <u>Health</u>¹ shall provide the Department of Education with a copy of the list and guidance documents developed pursuant to subsection c. of this section, and the Department of ¹[Environmental Protection] <u>Health</u>¹ and Department of Education shall each post a copy of the list and the guidance documents in a publicly accessible location on the respective department's Internet website.
